4. DISCUSSION

The purpose of the report is to inform the Committee of the activities of City Health (CH) for the period 1 January 2020 to 31 March 2020.

4.1 DEPARTMENTAL HIGHLIGHTS AND CHALLENGES

- The Health Department held 4 Capacity Building Programmes during the period 17 - 26 February 2020 for Senior Citizens in partnership with Sub Council 13. The programmes targeted elderly people with the main focus of raising awareness around

Council policies such as the indigent grant, rebate policy and housing policies and also facilitated various health promotions and awareness sessions. These initiatives attracted more than 1000 senior citizens in the Philippi and Crossroads Areas.

- 89% of the clients within the Substance Abuse: Eerste River Matrix site has tested negative for substance abuse. The Social Support Group had six clients which completed a three-day basic computer skills training and received certificates of competency and attendance.
- The eight-week phase for the Live Well Challenge focusing on clients resumed at Kensington Rehabilitation centre on 30th January 2020 and EF Erasmus Hall in Scottsville on 1st February 2020.
- The City Health Research Day was held on 27 February, and was well attended by City Health staff and researchers from academic institutions in Cape Town. There were 10 oral presentations and 9 posters, which had been submitted according to relevance to City Health's service delivery priorities on the theme of "From Protocol to Policy". Through "round table" discussions, future research priorities and processes to foster collaboration started to surface. Cllr Badroodien welcomed everyone to the day, and together with the Director: City Health, Dr Fareed, noted the potential for City of Cape Town's possible transversal projects to be informed by research, such as the "**First 1000 days**" Where a Child's Health is most vulnerable during the first 1 000 days of its life. This period, from conception until a child's 2nd birthday, offers a unique window of opportunity to shape healthier and more prosperous futures: <https://www.westerncape.gov.za/first-1000-days/>.
- The Air Quality Management has successfully defended a number of appeals against Administrative decision making in terms of the Promotion of Administrative Justice Act. This has included appeals to the City's Appeal Authority, related to the granting of Astron Energy Refinery's renewal of their Atmospheric Emission License by the Legal Resource Centre on behalf of the Table View Ratepayers Association, as well as appeals lodged in relation to Administrative fines issued in terms of the National Environmental Management Air Quality Act.

- The Air Quality Management Unit has received confirmation of a R1 000 000.00 fine payment from an illegal operator of a Listed Activity - Lead & Solder Sales, in terms of S22A of the NEM: Air Quality Act. The company also gave notice in the High Court of their intention to seek a fine reduction. The City gave notice of its intention to oppose the matter and the applicant subsequently withdrew their notice.
- National Atmospheric Emission Reporting Regulations (NAEIS): The deadline for industries to report to the NAEIS Portal was 31 March 2020. By 31 March 2020 all but three Industries in the City's Area of jurisdiction had submitted their reports. The National Minister subsequently issued an extension to the reporting deadline to 30 April 2020 as a result of the COVID Pandemic.
- A new Special Food Unit has been established under the period of review and all Environmental Health Practitioners who will be responsible for this particular function have been fully trained to perform this task. The sampling function has totally been taken over by the Specialised Food Control Unit.
- A highly-polluted open dam in the informal settlements in Wallacedene has been filled in with building rubble by the Water and Sanitation Department making this particular area much safer and healthier for the community staying adjacent to the dam. This after the intervention of the Environmental Health.
- The group of refugees living outside the Green Market Square were removed on 28 February 2020. The area was fully sanitised after the removal of the informal housing structures and an increased block baiting services has commenced on 02 March 2020.
- Environmental Health Practitioners have increased their monitoring and surveillance of dumping hotspots as February is one of the hottest months of the year and is associated with an increase in the presence of flies which is a well-known vector of disease. Sewer blockages are also closely monitored and reported almost immediately to the service departments, which will assist in the reduction of flies.

CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19) & INITIATIVES IMPLEMENTED

During the period under review up until 14 April 2020 the country experienced 637 confirmed cases in the Western Cape with 536 (84%) in the CCT Metro. The cases are still predominantly in the Western and Southern Sub Districts; however, we are seeing increasing community spread. We predict that 322 (51%) cases have recovered (unconfirmed), with 8 deaths (1%).

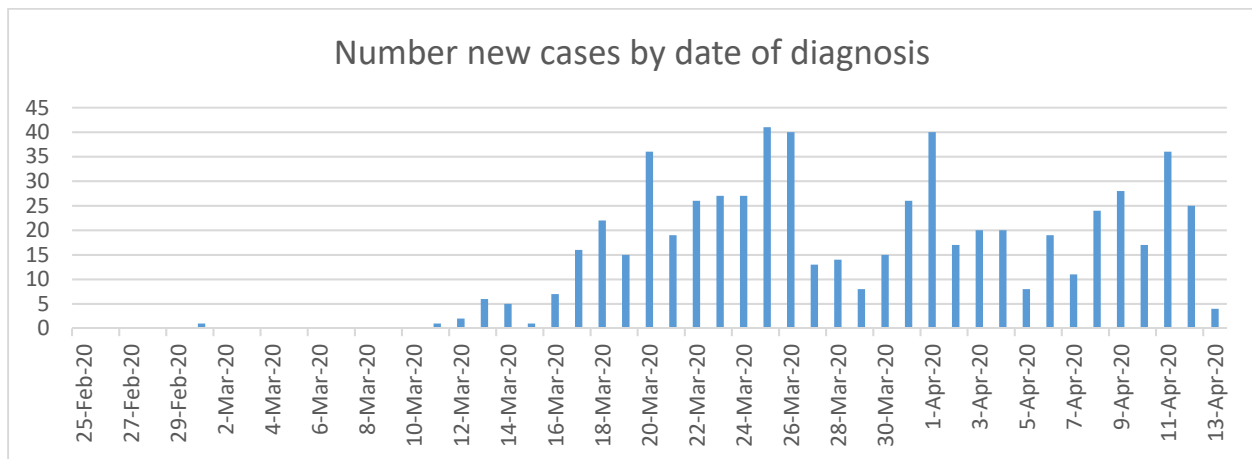
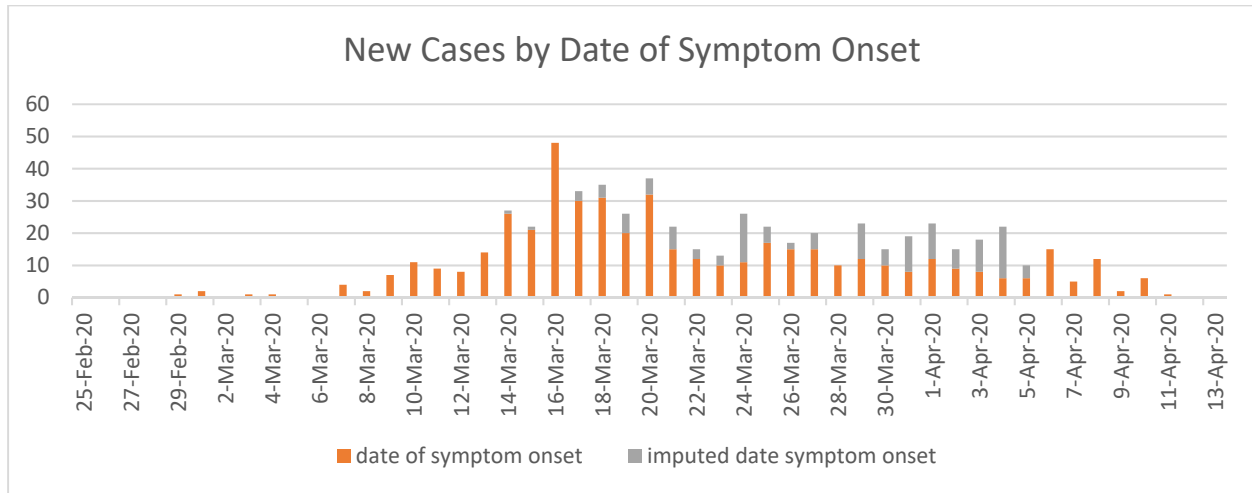

Since the start of the epidemic (In the quarter 3 period) we have seen an average increase in cases of 14 cases per day, with the incident cases decreasing overtime.

By displaying the incidence by date of diagnosis and date of onset of symptoms one can see that there is on average 5-8-day lag between symptom onset and diagnosis. Earlier cases were diagnosed earlier and this may be due to accessibility of testing by the private sector.



The mass screening and testing has been launched in the Metro and in response to this City Health has launched testing at the following health care facilities:

- Area East: Kuyasa CDC and Town 2 clinic
- Area Central: St Vincent CDC and Gugulethu Clinic
- Area South: Alphen clinic and Westridge clinic
- Area North: Albow Gardens clinic and Bloekombos clinic

Between Week 6-10 April:

- Town 2: 438 screened, 30 tests
- Albow Gardens: 20 tests
- Strandfontein: 1552 screenings

Going forward the department aims to expand testing with the provision of the necessary PPE to all City facilities especially in vulnerable areas.

The department has since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic been involved in various communication outreach initiatives to staff and the communities.

External communication was done across various platforms which included:

- Social media: Social distancing & Handwashing video clips.
- Media releases in general and community newspapers on de-escalation of clinic services.
- Radio interviews by Khayelitsha staff on Radio Zibonele and by the Mayor and Mayco member at 6 different radio stations.
- Various posters and pamphlets were distributed to Personal Primary Health Care and Environmental Health Practitioners (The use of communal taps and toilets and handwashing -Isolation / quarantine -Social distancing -General COVID 19 Information-Hand Hygiene-General cleaning and disinfecting of Surfaces and collecting of chronic medication).
- The City's website was updated.
- Messaging was done by DRM staff using loudhailers in informal settlements.

Internal communication was done via:

- Information sessions were held on 24th March 2020 with staff on the 22nd floor at Civic Centre, Cape Town.
 - Health Communication was sent out on 7 April 2020
 - What's App platforms with Managers and Heads which is ongoing.
- City Health staff were proactive and creative in finding ways to educate clients regarding social distancing, i.e. marking benches, walls and floors to ensure that clients keep a 1 metre distance between them to prevent the spread of the COVID-19 disease. The City Health staff were also trained on management, prevention and control of the COVID-19 disease.

Furthermore, the department continues to demonstrate the importance of hand-washing, social-distancing, symptoms awareness and self-isolation. The department has also continued to ensure that the screening of clients outside facilities by designated staff is ongoing and the appointment system is being stepped up and non-essential visits cancelled or postponed.

- Environmental Health Services within the City Health Department were reconfigured to deal with the demands of COVID 19. The staff across the areas and sub-districts were divided into teams with 3 main responsibilities: 1. Educational Outreaches, 2. Contact Tracing and 3. Servicing the communities at risk in terms of water, solid waste removal, and provision of toilets. The work of the Environmental Health in contact tracing is commendable and is being monitored on a daily basis.
- Health Information Awareness Campaigns with regard to COVID-19 was conducted by the Environmental Health Practitioners via the distribution of information pamphlets to approximately 254 schools and Early Childhood Development Centres, 13 Old Age Homes, 122 General Practitioners, Pharmacists and Hospitals, 18 Accommodation Establishments, 341 Food Establishments, Informal Settlements, NGO's and Sub Council 2, 3 and 6 for all Councillors, Ward Committees.

103 visits were done to shopping centres within the Northern Area to ensure that the principles of social distancing are applied effectively. All shopping centres were requested to ensure that all taps at the ablution facilities be opened and provided with soap and/or hand sanitizer.

- Environmental Health engagement with the Muslim Funeral Undertakers Forum resulted in the development of a protocol that can be used during the time of COVID-19 outbreak for faith based burials. All funeral undertaker premises have been visited to ensure that the owners are aware of COVID-19 specific requirements and to ensure that these requirements are adhered to.
- Mental Health Awareness newsletters were developed and issued to staff to support them with coping with the stress and dangers of the COVID 19 disease.

4.2 SIGNIFICANT CHALLENGES

- The safety of staff remains an on-going issue in the respective Sub Councils and is a major concern. In order for staff to enforce legislation, the staff at times finds that they are intimidated when issuing, notices and fines i.e. during raids and due to continuous gang violence etc.
- The Noise Control Unit and the Air Quality Management Units have experienced unintended consequences of Load shedding, which has impacted negatively on services. The Noise Unit experienced a 200% increase in noise complaints related to the installation and operation of standby Generators in the month of February, over the preceding months. This is unprecedented and the volumes of noise complaints usually decrease from that experienced over the festive season. Load shedding also affects the data recovery rates from the City's ambient air quality monitoring network. The Noise Control Section, has reported that with the COVID Lockdown, ambient noise levels have been drastically reduced. This has had the negative impact in that source noise from Industries and the like, are now being perceived as being much louder. This is due to the abnormal circumstances as a result of reduced Community activities.
- The continued occupation of Woodstock Hospital remains challenging from a health point of view in terms of refuse removal and the impact on the outdated sewage system. City Health engagements with the Manager: Land Reform, Social and Gap Housing is being held to address blockages and increase refuse removal services. Engagements regarding this challenge is ongoing.
- Load shedding has an impact on service delivery at City Health clinics and this has created a lot of obstacles with regards to cold chain maintenance of food items. Some retailers do not have efficient back-up systems which have a direct impact on keeping temperatures in range. Complaints have been received of meat and milk products being "off" due to rise in temperatures above 5°C.

- The biggest challenge at this stage is the fear of the staff with regard to the following: Contracting the disease and to pass it onto their families at home due to the unknown and uncertainty of the impact of COVID-19.
- Besides the challenges posed by COVID 19, the department received Notice of a High Court challenge regarding the interpretation and application of NEMAQA Listing Notice, Category 10 Animal Matter Processing facilities – Fusion Leather in Atlantis, has sought a declaratory order regarding the fact that as a leather processing facility, they are of the view that they are excluded from requiring an Atmospheric Emission Licence. This view is not supported by guidance we received from the National Department (DEFF). The City had previously written to the National Minister regarding challenges with the current Listing Notice 893 of 2013, as a result of this, the City has agreed to give notice of our intention to abide with the ruling of the Court. The National Department has given notice of its intention to oppose the matter.

The Operating budget is R1, 619,381,225 with an overall year to date expenditure of R1, 126,799,654 as at 31 March 2020.

The current underspent on salaries & wages is being addressed in a major drive to fill all currently vacant positions within the department.

The quarter also includes some unplanned expenditure due to the Covid-19 crisis, this is being carefully monitored for adjustments to be put in place.

The delay in tenders for construction (e.g. 182Q) of which some are still being evaluated.

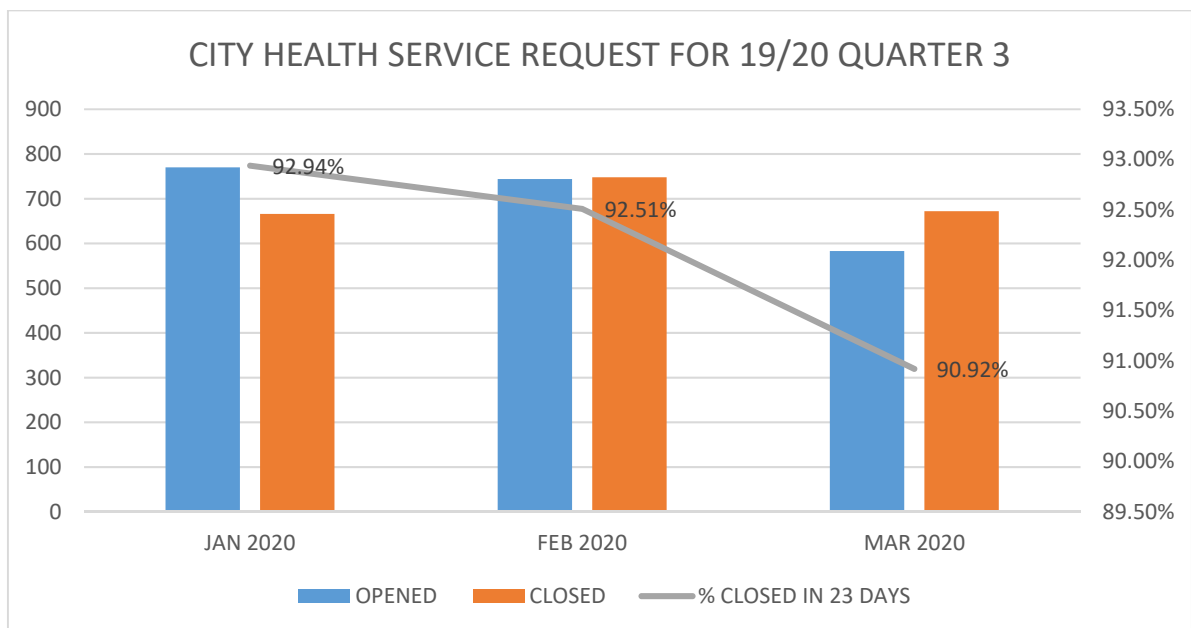

The achieved of 54.30% against the target of 70% is considerably low due to the following reasons:

- There were delays in procurement of suitable providers for specialised training interventions;
- There were delays in issuing of bursary outcome letters, and inability of CCT to pay numerous key institutions due to non-compliance with regards to SCM policy and legislation; and
- The suspension of all training due to the outbreak of COVID-19. No invoices can be GRN'd until training is completed following the lifting of the lock down in SA.
