5. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report provides an overview of the activities of the Library and Information Services department (LIS) for the period 1 July to 30 September 2019.

7. DISCUSSION/CONTENTS

The Department aims for excellence in providing a highly professional and cost-effective lending, reference and community information service. This report deals with the monitoring of service delivery.

7.1.1 Programmes (Events and promotions)

An overview of new membership, circulation, gate readings and Smart Cape usage at the libraries, as well as an analysis of the types of programmes and the number of attendees per programme per library is attached as Annexure A.

Bishop Lavis library hosted a Women's Day programme on 20 of August 2019 for 30 seniors who are regular patrons. The library worked in partnership with loonic Beauty Salon which is based in Athlone. Ladies were pampered with massages, foot massages, haircare and nail care. Iconic Beauty Salon staff know exactly how to pamper and care for the ladies – with a focus on treating them as VIPs. Lunch was served to 30 senior ladies sponsored by the staff.

On 18 July 2019, staff made and served approximately 50 cups of soup to the patrons visiting the library.

A staff member, Unathi Mapongwana, facilitated a 5-day digital literacy programme with unemployed youth from Bishop Lavis and Freedom Farm Informal Settlements. The sessions covered an introduction to basic computer skills, compiling a curriculum vitae and an introduction to various job sites on the internet. They also taught the youth how to create an email account and how to use PressReader. The library also offered information literacy sessions, story time sessions and library orientation sessions during the period in question.

Bonteheuwel library also conducted story time sessions, library orientations and reading programmes. Approximately 700 pupils attended these sessions during the period in question. This library also hosted a chess tournament during the school holidays and the winners of the tournament represented Bonteheuwel library at the annual Chess@libraries competition at Parow library. The library staff also assisted the matriculants from Modderdam High School with their assignments and also assisted them with their applications for university entrance and for bursaries.

During the September 2019 school holidays, 129 children attended the various educational, entertaining and fun programmes at the library. The library partnered with the Social Development and Early Childhood Development Department, the City Health Department, and other organisations to make the holiday programme a success.

During this quarter four educare centres namely Don Bosco, ACVV, IKhayelitsha, Pinochio and Vergenoegd Primary School were visited by the new Children's Librarian, Emily Afrikaner, from Delft library to introduce herself and the services provided by the library. To conclude these very successful

meet – and – greet sessions she also did storytelling and library orientation sessions with them.

The library held a holiday programme in collaboration with the Department of Water and Sanitation, Safeline and the Dental Health clinic. These programmes were attended by 125 children.

Three youths from Voorbrug in Delft represented Delft library at the Chess@libraries tournament held at the Parow library on Thursday, 26 September 2019. Delft South Library conducted 24 story telling sessions with 361 children from Klein Begin, Siyakha, Arise and Shine, Nyamezela, United Pistache and Themba Educare Centres.

On 22 August 2019 the library visited and conducted storytelling sessions at the Tsunami Informal Settlement (Pistache Educare), where 45 children attended the session. These sessions are conducted in order to inculcate a culture of reading amongst children.

Delft South Library in partnership with Young people @ work conducted basic computer skills training sessions for unemployed youth. Areas covered during this intervention included introduction to computers (hardware & software), different types of memory storage, file management, different application programmes, appropriate use of computers, word processing, CV design and how to create email accounts.

Special Programmes/Events

Bonteheuwel library had a Women's Day event in August which was themed: "A balanced world is a better world". One hundred grade 11 girls from Bonteheuwel High School attended this event. Councillor Angus Mackenzie, Aneesa "The Cake Lady", Fadeela Davids and Ritqah Jamie were some of the guests who encouraged the students to pursue their dreams and to live a balanced life.

The library hosted its 4th annual Spelling Bee on 17 September 2019. There were 36 pupils in attendance from 3 different schools (Bergsig, Boundary and Cedar Primary Schools).

Integrated Storytelling Sessions: Delft & Delft South Libraries

Delft and Delft South Libraries conducted integrated storytelling sessions at 2 Educare centres, namely Pistache Educare in the Tsunami Informal Settlement, Delft South and Pinocchio Educare in Voorbrug. Eighty-eight children participated in these integrated storytelling sessions.

Delft South Library in partnership with Safeline and the Department of Water and Sanitation Services, conducted a safety and water awareness outreach programme with 27 children and teens on 26 September 2019.

In light of the recent attacks on foreign nationals in some parts of the country, Delft South library hosted a Heritage Day event as a follow up to the recent Africa Day event held at the same library. The purpose of this event was to

foster more integration between communities using the library as the go-to-point in order to try and prevent such incidents from happening in our communities. Fifty people including, Adonis Musati, representing vulnerable foreign nationals' interests; Group of Hope, representing senior citizens; Young Visionaries representing vulnerable youth and Touching Nations, an NGO assisting with healthcare especially for seniors, were amongst the attendees at this event.

Delft South Library attended Molo Songololo's Gender-Based Violence drive held at Welwitchia Primary School. The library's visit was aimed at the promotion of available library resources that can assist in dealing with the issue as well as building and strengthening partnerships between stakeholders present on the day.

7.1.2 Challenges/Successes

On 29 August 2019, a patron suffered a seizure in Bonteheuwel library. The staff member trained in administering first aid attended to the individual. After the seizure subsided the staff member ensured that the patron was conscious and able to communicate.

On 9 July 2019 and 19 July 2019, 2 Smart Cape CPUs were stolen from the Delft South Library. These incidents were reported to the police. Currently internal processes are being followed in order to obtain replacement items.

7.1.3 Repairs and maintenance

No significant repairs and maintenance took place during Quarter 4.
