As discussed you will begin the process to obtain designs and provide information about this on receipt. Kindly indicate how long this might take?

As indicated by Mr Malan, Mr Von Moltke might wish to give input around the design

Response from Roelou Malan dated 15 April 2019 refers:

The easiest way to fence of the park is to install the fence on the edge of the sidewalk. The whole process will be shortened and no EIA process will be required.

Gates can be erected to allow access to the Park via the Old Bridge and a secondary gate at the existing gate for vehicles if required

The real problem is unfortunately the location of the park within the floodplain and close to the bridge structures.

Collapsible fencing sound like a good idea but there are no approved designs available.

My personal opinion is that fencing will enhance the risk of flooding of Stormhaven.

I do not have the authority to approve any design and are only responsible for maintenance actions as approved by Catchment Management.

Please obtain the opinion of Mr Franz Von Moltke.

Response from Ald Stuart Pringle dated 28 March 2019 refers:

It is becoming very difficult to deal with this matter because several officials contribution appears to be limited to telling me what their very strict function will be and who should do everything else. There is no coordination, and I am unsure who is supposed to do what in what order.

From what I can gather, and I might be wrong and hopefully someone will be able to guide me accordingly, but who knows:

1. City Parks are required to have a design done for the fence and indicate where they would like it placed;
2. The fence has to comply with catchment management's conditions, but this won't be known until the fence is designed and a place indicated. It is not sure whether or not catchment management will be prepared to indicate ahead of time, where the fence would be acceptably placed.
3. Once that is then done, and if Catchment Management agree, then an EIA process will have to be done.

Could I request therefore that the sub council manager action the following steps be considered:

1. Parks to attend to the design;
2. Parks to attend to identification of where the fence is to be positioned;
3. Parks to submit to Catchment Management for their consideration;
4. Once we have dealt with the issues raised; Parks to submit the document to Environmental Management to get the EIA process going.

Please confirm that this will be in order.

Response from Goodman Rorwana dated 8 March 2019 refers:

I had a meeting with Mr Mbusi in my office today discussing the matter above and it appeared that City Parks do not have problem of erecting or getting quotes for the collapsible fence as proposed. All what Recreation and Parks need is to get support and inputs from the line departments mentioned under in order to draw up a correct specification that will meet every line department needs.

It is noted that over the past few months many facilities such as the Monwabisi Resort, Desmond Tutu Recreation Centre, Solomon Halangu Recreation Centre etc. have all been vandalized. The department of Recreation and Parks is establishing a working group to ensure that we manage vandalism and neglected properties to ensure it does not become a Problem Building.

Many facilities are vandalized repeatedly, public funding has to be diverted from other crucial projects to fix damages, the department will be investigating new ways to safeguard facilities.

I've further done a due-diligence and could not trace any formal building plans, I've contacted Property Management and they have advised that the property is City-owned and Recreation and Parks is the accountable department. The department will conduct a full investigation regarding the current use of activities and the condition of the building.

If there are illegal activities, we will engage the organisation/occupiers and regularize this matter either:

- Through a formal lease application submitted to use the facility, by serving a letter highlighting the illegal activities and unauthorized use, giving them a reasonable time period to respond; and
- If no response is received we need to act with a notice to vacate the premise also within reasonable time or immediate effect depending on the type of illegal activities. Should no action be forthcoming from the unlawful occupiers, we then need to proceed with legal action in terms of an eviction.

According to the contractor's programme the signals should be operational by May 2020, but is subject to any delays that might be encountered on the project. Yes the signalization of the 3 ramp terminals on the N2 to Khayelitsha has been in the cards for some time now. This is under the jurisdiction of SANRAL. Unfortunately promised timelines keep changing to a point where I can't keep track. This is unfortunately out of our control as SANRAL is responsible. Few months ago I was advised that there a talks between SANRAL to rather implement signalization via our signals term tender. I have just followed up with Sean in this regard and will keep you on the loop.

The same can be said for N2 and Baden Powell , and Baden Powell and Old Faure road at the roadworks , it's a total nightmare for people wanting to join Baden Powell from the N2 wishing to turn right towards Muizenberg or left to Stellenbosch. Same at old Faure , it's life threatening wanting to turn right towards Muizenberg.

Either way , it's a scary life threatening movement.

QUESTION: Will traffic lights be erected in the near future ?

It better come with this road improvement otherwise we're just creating nice intersections that will become serious high risk crossings.

Back to Baden Powell and Japhta K.Masemola.

Colleagues , I will gladly put 2 officers there to assist , the fact however is **I do not** have the personnel. (I can try get from other areas but then they've got their own challenges)

Furthermore , at any given time I should have **6 officers on duty** , that's if no one is off-sick / on leave / study leave / time-off/ IOD etc etc.

With the officers on duty we **must** cover the N2 / Mew way as well as the N2 / Spine road bridge points , that's 4 officer out of the equation , then we still have to attend to accidents and complaints on the N2 / R300 as well as in the residential area.

QUESTION: Will traffic lights ever be erected on these 2 bridges , in **2016** I enquired about these traffic lights and was informed that in September of that year it will be installed , it is now 2019, still nothing. (Spoke to Sean Glass , Andre Nel and people at Province)

Solomzi , I will still see what I can do in terms of assistance at Baden Powell and Japhta K.Masemola , but for the rest , I'm leaving it in your capable hands to get us some answers.

I very seldom turn to your office for assistance, but I do so now and request that your office please assist in order to prevent the growing unhappiness in Sir Lowry's Pass Village which is the subject of the several subjoined emails. While these subjoined emails only go back as far as February this year, this matter has been the subject of a motion to the sub council since 2016 and the lack of response from City officials has been, to put it mildly, very disappointing.

In brief there are residents living in informal structures along the railway line on land belonging to Transnet in Sir Lowry's Pass Village and they have been there for the better part of 2 decades. In spite of a motion to the sub council in or about 2016 that the City please engage with Transnet about what is to be done about the people living along the railway line, the movement on this matter has been glacial. One young child has already been seriously injured when a train derailed a few years ago, the other residents are in as much danger and the illegal electricity connections, as well as illegal pig farming which has a huge environmental health impact on neighbouring residents. While the last matter is being dealt with by the City's Health Department, together with Urban Management, it will ultimately require a resolution to the issue of the illegal occupation of the Transnet land and that is what the Human Settlements Department have been indicating for the past several years they have been dealing with.

Unfortunately as can be seen from the subjoined emails and the unanswered motions to the sub council, while the City may well be attending to this, there is no feedback and no communication. This makes my role as ward councillor very difficult as I keep having no response to the questions residents raise about progress in this matter.

I would therefore greatly appreciate your assistance herein.

One could consider using the proposed public road which is to be constructed as part of access to the Casa Marais Eco-Village.

The aforementioned access road is located within the existing rail corridor of the Cape Town to Bot River railway line, and runs from the Naauwlands Road up to the entrance to the Casa Marais Eco-Estate. *See attached horizontal alignment of the access road for the Casa Marais Eco-Estate.*

However, in order to gain access to the future public road via the Old Sir Lowry's Pass road one will need to cross the existing railway line. At present the Old Sir Lowry's Pass Road railway crossing is closed to traffic and cannot be accessed.

Possible options/solutions:

Approach Spoornet/Rail freight to get permission to cross the railway line, or
Consider a grade separation bridge over the railway line thereby connecting with the public road for the Casa Marais Eco-Estate. Complaint from Sir Lowry's Pass Ratepayers Association dated 21 October 2020 refers:

Afternoon Brandon / Ndzululwazi

Today we have had 3 overflow incidents around raw sewage flowing down various streets within our area today which was raised with the association directly.

To assist with the process we now have generated a master register from our end to track these issues. With this, we have been fortunate to have a view of existing sewage runs on a map which we have now used to look at where the respective pressure points are on the existing network (refer below picture highlighting known pressure points on the network and a log table of items made aware of today).

Noting that the original sewage infrastructure was deployed many years ago and before the additional developments of Sun City, Rimfasmaak, etc... This infrastructure now also needs to accommodate the additional capacity which potentially the existing sewage runs/infrastructure is not equipped to handle.

Hopefully this will assist you and the rest of the team to identify and hopefully remediate the blockage points as to limit overflow and raw sewage running into our rivers in the area which has a direct risk on the ecosystem and biodiversity downstream.

More-importantly our Association Health Services exec member, who is also a registered Health professional, highlighted the health risk of these types of events and more importantly the health advisories which highlights the risk of a new virulent strain of meningitis which is becoming more evident in SA. One can only imagine the consequences if there is an outbreak today on top of covid which is already putting many individuals, families and state resources under severe strain.

We hope this info will assist you in final solution drafting of a plan which can remediate this challenge once and for all in due course.

To grid option is a very expensive solution. (No guarantee, the previous grids were systematically vandalised until nothing was left.) This branch indicated that the grid option is a better solution than the fencing option.

Short Term Solution

Operational team will continue to attend to clear the blockages as and when they get reported by the residents. A Jet truck will be utilised to clean the sewer pipeline to lessen the sewage blockages in the interim.

MediumTerm Solution

CCTV camera crew would be arranged to inspect the sewer lines to determine the condition of the sewer pipeline which result to the frequent sewage blockages. This work would have to taken sometime next year because there is a limited number of the equipment and the others are at the workshop for repairs.

Long Term Solution

The technical office would be required to include this sewer pipeline into their sewer replacement program after the outcomes of the investigations.

I refer to previous emails, including attached and thank you for pursuing this.

I am copying in Ald Xanthea Limberg's office as I believe that the subjoined emails reveal a number of challenges I trust she will be raising with the Executive Director.

I am astounded at the contents of subjoined email as it appears to have been written as though this was a new issue which arose a few days ago. It isn't and a brief perusal of the regular C3 reports regarding sewage overflows for the area over the past 4 years would indicate that there is a problem. The fact that after all these years, no camera inspection has taken place is nothing short of staggering.

Yes, there is an issue of people's litter ending up in the system. Hence the implementation of additional public litter bins in parts of the area, with more to be rolled, pursuant to a motion I brought to the sub council. There is also additional cleansing for the area funded from Ward allocations, as there has been for the past several years, which is now augmented by MURP funded area cleansing. So everybody does seem to be getting there.

Yes, there is a need for continual and ongoing education, and this too is being done and the most recent such intervention was the distribution of pamphlets in the area and their placement at the Somerset West library by me.

What is missing is any sense of urgency to inspect the actual system in spite of various site visits over the past year and a constant stream of reasons why no camera was available. If it is correct that there isn't a camera available in the entire City, then I trust this has been brought to the Executive Director's attention, as clearly a budget adjustment needs to be made to purchase same. As per the various site visits which have taken place, the problems along School and October Streets, according to residents, began during the road works which were completed last year. There may well be some damage therefore to the system which a camera inspection would ascertain. The Mataung, Mandela and Brinkuis Street part of the system may well be as a result of damage and / or tree roots and again, a camera inspection ought to reveal whether or not this is so.

It cannot be acceptable that residents who have been raising these issues time and time again will again have to go through a Christmas season with sewage running through their streets and I would therefore appreciate it if your office could assist in injecting a greater sense of urgency into this matter.

The initial installation cost for a suitable fence will be high as it would either be concrete palisade or high security dublo mesh fencing (rough estimate of R4.5 to R5 million for all 4 ponds). That said, we do not have capital funding to fence around ponds.

The maintenance of fences also becomes problematic as; (i) we do not know the maintenance frequency, (ii) we do not know what the maintenance cost will be each year to allow for budget, (iii) we do not have a suitable fencing term tender in place thus the RFQ route need to be undertaken, restricting us to R200 000, inclusive of VAT. Scope of work also need to be clearly identified and specified.

As per my experience, the fencing of ponds is not a viable option/solution. Fences gets vandalized and or removed/stolen. For example the galvanized palisade fence along Spine Road at the Kuils river, which is a busy, frequently used road, yet nearly 300m of fence has been removed. Irrespective if there are gates, rubble, etc. gets dumped inside these fenced off areas.

Pond maintenance and cleaning is also hampered due to restricted access or limited access. An example, the fence around the pond at Kosovo A. Gate left open and unattended, concrete panels removed and litter/rubble, etc. dumped inside fenced area.

It should also be noted that 2 of these pond are being used as grazing areas for cattle. These ponds are not deep and have sloped embankments and is thus not a safety concern. These ponds are also dry ponds.

We therefore do not recommend the fencing of these ponds based on the information above. The community should therefore take ownership and look after the area to prevent illegal dumping, etc. Illegal dumping should also be reported to the respective Law Enforcement Department.
