Subject: Traffic Calming Request: Cnr Main & Hill Road, Green Point

**Dafe**: 12 March 2019

The City of Cape Town Traffic Calming Policy (CaCT) aims to protect the most vulnerable road users, where they occur in the largest numbers on a Class 4 Collector Street and/or Class 5 Local Street in a residential area in the vicinity of public facilities, with roads adjacent to and leading to schools being the primary focus of attention. This being the case, a systematic program is in place for the treatment of all educational facilities over the next few years as a priority, which will not permit Transport Directorate to investigate and implement calming measures at other locations.

Speeding is a universal issue throughout the Cape Town metropolitan area and therefore cannot be used in its entirety to justify the need for traffic calming. The CoCT currently uses land use activity and crash history as a quantifiable objective in determining risk potential over the numerous traffic calming applications, which are currently being received on a daily basis. The desired outcome of this approach is to ensure a sustainable programme for the provision of traffic calming measures that is more responsive to critical road safety problems that arise from time to time on residential roads.

Hill Road, Green Point is a class 5 Local Street with an approximate total road length of 255m. Main Road (at Hill Road) is a Class 3 secondary arterial, where traffic calming is not permitted due to high levels of mobility that must be maintained. Traffic signals are warranted when the queue lengths in the side road exceeds the limits stipulated in the Roads Traffic Signs Manual. Traffic signals are not warranted based on the volume survey i.e. it does not meet the minimum requirement for volume split as well as a minimum queue length as stipulated within the SADC, RISM and SARTSM.

A study was conducted to eliminate the safety concerns currently being experienced at High Level Road/ Hill Road intersection. This would be achieved by a proposal to change Hill Road into a one-way away from High Level Road. It was further suggested that this proposed one-way should be discontinuous i.e. not run towards Main Road itself but rather that this would be a one-way away from High Level Road and a one-way from Main Road towards Antrim Road in order to combat the rat-running activity. This proposal will however require a Public Participation Process (PPP) to be conducted in order to poll support from the local community interested and affected parties. A PPP has a minimum timeline of 90 days to completion.
