#### Subcouncil 5 Chairperson's Report

Date: 16 September 2020

#### Venue: Virtual Meeting via Skype

A warm welcome to all Councillors, Subcouncil 5 Manager, Municipal officials from the various directorates and Subcouncil staff, to our virtual Subcouncil 5 Meeting.

We welcome the Miss SA finalists in Cape Town, ahead of the historic Cape Town Competition. It will be the first time in the competition's 62-year-old history that Miss South Africa is crowned in Cape Town. This is

a great booster to get the economy back on its feet, after being hit by the COVID-19 pandemic as the result of the lockdown.

City named most trusted in South Africa, 7<sup>th</sup> time in a row

Short on the heels of the City of Cape Town being named the most sustainable metro in South Africa by Ratings Afrika, the City has just been shown to be the most trusted metro in South Africa according to Consulta's latest Citizen Satisfaction Index, which measures trust and satisfaction by residents in their municipalities. This is the seventh consecutive year the City has received this rating.

The report notes: 'Of the eight metros polled, Cape Town has once again emerged as the best performing metro on the overall Citizen Satisfaction for 'Large Metros' recording the highest score for the seventh consecutive year. Cape Town recorded a score of 66,0 out of a possible 100 in the latest index - a two-point improvement on its previous score of 64,1 in 2019. It is also more than 10-points above the par score of 55,7 for all municipalities and well ahead of all other metros.

The City scored the highest trust rating of 72,0 out of a 100, this is 8,6 index points higher than the average.

## Cape Town calls for more Public Order Policing support to protect public land from illegal invasion

The City of Cape Town has taken its call for more Public Order Policing support to the National Assembly's Police portfolio

#### committee. Executive Mayor Alderman Dan Plato, Mayco Member for Safety and Security Alderman JP Smith and officials briefed the committee on the Friday morning of the 4<sup>th</sup> September 2020, at the City's 4<sup>th</sup> recent appearance in Parliament.

'We all saw the nature of the recent Cape Town land invasions in the media and our neighbourhoods, and the huge spike of well-organised invasion attempts in over 30 different parts of the metro. Within our limited resources, we are standing firm against land invasions, but we cannot do it alone. We need Public Order Policing support to protect land intended for housing, community facilities, schools, transport, and basic services' said Mayor Plato.

In my capacity as Subcouncil 5 Chairperson, the concerns relating to land invasion were raised in my meeting held with the Executive Mayor Dan Plato on the 14<sup>th</sup> September 2020 and my recommendations were well received and the assurance was given that the land invasion in Delft will receive the required urgent attention.

"I also received an email communication from residents from Delft and I quote"

I hope this mail finds you well, I have been a delft resident for 30 years now already and this is one of the most concerning events EVER taking place as I'm typing this email.

We are being bombarded with illegal land invasion in the Delft/Leiden area and it's spreading like wild fire, I'm sure as our area's Councillor you are aware of this. There is no sign of the police or law enforcement doing anything about this, and all open areas/field is being taken, me and 1000's of other Delft residence is very concerned as our area is already unsafe as it is, what new challenge will this people bring.

The fields they setting up on, has no facilities in terms of electricity, water or sanitation, I suspect illegal connection will be made soon, PAYING neighbouring houses water bills will rise, let me not even start with the sanitation problem.

Is there a plan in getting them removed, as before (a month or two ago)?

"Hope to hear from you soon".

I have responded to the email received from the resident and gave the assurance that we are doing everything in our power to deal with the land invasion concerns.

Despite the impact and delays COVID-19 has had on numerous projects within the City, I am happy to announce that the housing developments within our Subcouncil 5 is slowly materialising. The 201 units for the Eindhoven Housing Development will soon commence in October 2020 and the Valhalla Park Housing Development are expected to have a total of 90 houses to be completed by December 2020. The Project Steering Committee met on the 10 September 2020, Councillor A Abrahams or Alderman T Thompson to provide feedback relating to the outcome of the meeting.

Our Councillors have been flooded with queries and concerns from members of the community relating to the delay of various service deliveries such as faulty street lights, blocked sewers and potholes in various parts of the community. The delay in resolving these service request can lead to unlawful criminal activities, and impact the health risks within our communities. I therefore would like to request that the Subcouncil Manager follow-up on all the outstanding matters related to service deliveries and convene further intervention with the relevant departments to provide feedback on the reasons for the delay in resolving these outstanding matters

As reported in my Chairpersons Report on the 26<sup>th</sup> August 2020, I have compiled a detailed report on all transport relating concerns and would like to thank all Councillors for their efforts in providing me with the adequate information needed to assist with the completion of my report. A very productive meeting was held on the 14<sup>th</sup> September 2020 with the Executive Mayor Dan Plato and Ald. Felicity Purchase (Mayoral Committee member for Transport) outlining a detailed report on all the outstanding concerns relating to transport, such as:

- Concrete road issues for the Bonteheuwel, Bishop-Lavis and Valhalla Park areas.
- The resurfacing of the Delft main road.
- Sidewalks in Delft.
- The maintenance and upgrade of existing Public Transport interchanges in Delft
- The road marking's and quality of paint used for these road markings.
- Potholes
- Traffic calming measures

The Subcouncil welcomes the new approach taken by the Executive Mayor Dan Plato and Ald. Grant Twigg (Mayoral Committee Member for Urban Management) in relation to the Mayor's Visible Service Acceleration (MVSA) program which deals with areas who were not previously identified as MURP areas. It is foreseen that an estimate of five projects will be implemented in Delft, with the main focus being the Delft Main Road. At a meeting held on the 8<sup>th</sup> September 2020, Mr Patrick Nqadini presented the identified projects to all Councillors assigned to the Delft area for their attention and discussed the way forward. It was recommended that an Area Coordinating Task Team

(ACTT) for Delft should be implemented, as this will assist with separating Delft from the other MURP areas and for the successful roll out of these projects. A report will be submitted at the Subcouncil 5 Meeting scheduled for the 21 October 2020.

The HOPE Cape Town (NEX Project), which is a non-profit organisation which aims is to provide a more balanced society, by developing the capabilities of people, particularly children and youth in under privilege communities, by:

- Creating jobs and livelihoods;
- Expanding infrastructure;
- Transforming urban spaces;
- Improving education and training;
- Providing quality healthcare;
- Enabling social cohesion.

The organisation which is operating from a community outreach centre in Blikkiesdrop will be relocating to a larger location in the Delft area and a planned multipurpose facility is to be built on a site located at the cross of Delft Main Road and Vuurlelie Crescent, opposite the Caltex petrol station. The HOPE Cape Town Headquarters will provide the following community focused activities:

- Health / Wellness Centre;
- Vocational Training centre;
- Early Childhood Development Centre;
- Entrepreneurial Hub and
- Youth Centre.

On the 15<sup>th</sup> September 2020 Cllr Michelle Adonis attended a very successful public participation meeting with the community and stakeholders were The HOPE Cape Town presented, information relating to the clarification of the project. As the Subcouncil 5 Chairperson, I welcome this initiative which will further develop and strengthen the livelihood of the community of Delft.

As we are fast approaching the end of the year and drawing closer to our yearly recognition event where we acknowledge extraordinary performance of our Staff and Councillors rendering consistent and continuous outstanding services to the communities within our Subcouncil 5. The hosting of this ceremony will take place on the 25<sup>th</sup> November 2020 at the Durbanville Rose Garden. All nomination to be submitted to the Subcouncil Chairpersons office by the 18 September 2020.

I would like to acknowledge a letter of gratitude sent to Ald. Theresa Thompson by St Joseph's Home and I quote:

"We would like to express our sincere appreciation for your generous donation of food parcels including a big catering pot we have received from you during August, and can assure you that we add great value to it.

It is our mission to give the children at St Joseph's Home the best possible care and it is only with your help that we are able to continue to fulfil this important task.

Thank you for being part of our dreams and vision to improve the lives of vulnerable children in the Western Cape and giving them a second chance at childhood".

In conclusion I want to thank all Councillors, Subcouncil Staff and all departmental official for the hard work rendered throughout this year despite the uncertainty of COVID-19.

Let's work towards improving the quality of life for all the people we serve.

In terms of Section 21.3 of the Rules of Order for Subcouncil Meetings of the City of Cape Town, the Chairperson permitted the members to respond to the Chairperson's report.

Cllr Adonis: Good morning colleagues and officials, thank you Chairperson van Wyk for the comprehensive report which is always relevant in terms of the issues Councillors are dealing with and as well as very good news. Firstly, I would like to talk about the land invasion which I strongly condemned in the Delft area and I welcome and support the strong stand taken by the Mayor and the Subcouncil on land invasion as it really hampers the lives and progress of projects and really appreciate the stand taken by the mayor for increasing extra Law Enforcement in the affected areas. I also want to thank you Chairperson van Wyk for the interventions regarding the transport and service delivery issues within the Delft area, and also the administration of the Subcouncil for always assisting and taking progressive action. I also welcome the, Mayor's Visible Service Acceleration programme (MVSA) which will be inclusive with MURP extended project for the upgrades in the Delft area and also the Award Ceremony it is really an auspicious event and once again the Subcouncil has taken the lead as I have not heard of any other Subcouncil taking this initiative and therefore I am so glad of being part and to serve under this Subcouncil which acknowledges the hard work of the officials as well as the Councillors.

"The Hope" which will be rolled out in the boundaries of ward 13 and will service the entire area of Delft, which is an existing organization and has been in operation for 12 years and are currently situate in Blikkiesdorp, yesterday's meeting on the 15<sup>th</sup> September 2020 was well attended where members can give input on the project and also the buy-in of the community and other organisation, it was also confirmed work will commence from October 2020. I would therefore like to say thank you very much to the Subcouncil administration under the leadership of Chairperson van Wyk.

Ald. Thompson: thank you. Good morning everyone Councillors and officials. Chairperson just to comment on the Valhalla Park project to say how proud I am on the progress of the Valhalla Park housing project, they are busy compacting the ground now so that they can start building, I think they have been given about 3 weeks to do the compacting. The Project Steering Committee(PSC) has been taken on a site visit to other housing projects and in our PSC meeting held last week, we had an indication of what the houses would look like, which was agreed to by the steering Committee and everything is on track and everyone is happy, there is about 4 contractors on site to complete the allocated housing by the end of the year and also thank you Chairperson for your comprehensive report, thank you very much.

Cllr Cottee: Morning Chair, Morning Councillors, Manager and Officials. Chairperson I just want to raise two issues one is around the issue of land invasion which is becoming a serious problem I think I also raised it in the last Subcouncil meeting pertaining the illegal structure opposite Voorbrug. Chairperson my biggest concern is that our Law Enforcement agencies is not hands on in terms of the land invasion, I think by now our intelligence should tell us who the people are that are selling the plots and instigating people so I think we should really speak to our security cluster and figure out when/where the next land invasion will take place and arrest them. Chairperson the next point I want to raise and also makes reference to in your speech is around C3 Notifications and you also mentioned that you ask the administration to follow up on the outstanding issues and again I want to raise a concern I logged a complain about a week ago pertaining to a house in Bishop Lavis, the Westside, 3 Tuins Road and the truck arrived with an address for number 4 Tuins Road and they refused to assist I then had to contact the MAYCO member and ask for her assistance and maybe the officials who's dealing with these kind of issues should then just be more lenient, but thank you very much for your effort.

Chairperson van Wyk: thank you councillors that conclude the input from the councillors on my speech and would like to appeal from the Subcouncil Manager that the responses from the Councillors are minuted Verbatim. I would like to respond to Cllr Cottee who was the last speaker, thank you Councillor for your comments with regards to the land Invasion and concerns raised and I agree with your concerns about the intelligence and those people who are selling the plots and instigating these things, that one really needs to deal with that. I will be raising the concerns raised, in my follow up meeting with the Executive Mayor and Ald. Smith. ClIr Adonis I welcome your comments on the Transport and all the projects that's happening in Delft. Ald. Thompson very good news in terms of the outcome of the PSC and it is so important that there is stability and there is a good working relationship in participation with the PSC and I can see there is a good operation with PSC in the Valhalla Park everything is on track the site visit and the compacting of the ground and within the next three weeks can start building and that is so important and that mean the people will then gain in trust in us again so thank you very much Ald. Thompson for your report.

#### THE UPGRADE AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE DELFT MAIN ROAD

Mr. Bowker: Good morning everybody, thank you Chairperson for giving me the opportunity. The progress on this project is not great news unfortunately the professional service contract that was going to take this forward from July next year 2021 had to be cancelled due to the audit finding that had to do with local office tender eligibility criteria so that will probably set us back 6-8 months, so currently I am hoping to have a contract on the ground by March or April 2022 that is the earliest we can possibly get there, the replacement for the professional services will be advertised on the 11<sup>th</sup> November and that will be awarded in 2021 and that will give us time to go through the entire tender process as required to get the contract on the ground early 2022.

There was also a further delay in the advertising of the replacement because the service provider that was provisionally awarded the tender, the one which was cancelled appealed and objected to the cancellation and that took over a month to resolve, so while I was ready to go to advertising I couldn't advertise until the appeals was resolve that also added to the extra delay on the process unfortunately. Then I would also like to note my roads rehabilitation budget which come from External Financial Funds (EFF) has had to in line with the Mayoral instruction had to take a 30% budget cut a lot of projects was identified to be shifted out due to this but I know the importance of this and I insisted that this one stay on for as soon as possible and not be shifted out, so the Delft Main Road project hasn't been shifted due to the budget cut but 3 other projects of mine has been shifted back by 12 months , that is the update and I would be happy to answer any question.

Cllr Ndongeni: Good morning everybody and Good morning official, I think the official need to give us a written report, so that we can note it down, there are a lot of issues that arise, I also have a concern regards to the shift of the budget, but be made we don't have a written report so in future I suggest it should be placed on black and white so that we can read and ask questions based on the written report.

Cllr Adonis: Thank you Chairperson, yes I hear the report of the official it's rather disgruntling, I mean this is long outstanding and I mean our roads look like Delft is 30 years old and that road has never been rehabilitated, it is in a terrible stated I can also mention the Roosendal and Voorbrug Avenue which are the oldest area in Delft, but be it as it may the official did mention it will take up to 6-8 months so we will be anticipating but thank you for the feedback and the update we will be anticipating the 6-8 months, I also hope that Delft will be put on the priority list as this is long outstanding, thank you very much Chairperson.

Mr Bowker: The professional services contract which we required to be in place to assist with the tender process and the construction management is what's going to be in place by January than January or February depending on how the evaluation goes only after that we ne will require another 12 months for the tender process so 6-8 months is not quite correct, the current contract required by date on demand is March 2022

Chairperson van Wyk: I would like to thank the official again for attending our Subcouncil meeting and given the report although it's not good news, I value the report, officials I would just like you to put that in an e-mail and I would like to request that the administration record your input in verbatim of this particular item. I also agree with Cllr Ndongeni that next time we deal with these matter that it should also be put into writing but because it's on MRA we just invite the official so that we can record it as part of the MRA. **RESOLVED**: That the item remain on the MRA list

Cllr Adonis: This is very good news and I just want to say thank you very much.

Ms. Mdingi stated there were engagements with the relevant Department and have received contact numbers of the official to deal with sewer issues which occur on a regular basis and will do a follow up regarding the health inspector and Law Enforcement. She also stated during the week she has requested the Councillors to submit a list of all issues regarding streetlights and after the engagement with the relevant officials it was mentioned a new tender has been awarded and the contracted service provided are still getting familiar with the various routes, and confirmed with CIIr Adonis that she will convene a meeting with the officials of the Delft area pertaining to the streetlights.

Cllr Ndongeni indicated these request need to be forwarded as there are regular blockages occurring in front of Sunray Primary School and also where vendors are selling foods as well as the Delft Main Road and requested when doing the technical assessments, that it should include looking at the population as the area was not facilitated for the current population of the area.

Chairperson van Wyk suggested that all Councillors are invited to attend the meeting for the Service Request and meet with the senior officials. There was unanimous agreement with the recommendation
