

- 2.2 Unless the context dictates otherwise, the words, phrases and expressions set forth below shall bear the following meanings and cognate expressions shall bear corresponding meanings:
- 2.2.1 "Business Day" means every day except a Saturday, Sunday or an official public holiday in the Republic of South Africa.
- 2.2.2 J"Notice" means a written notice;
- 2.2.3 "Parties" means the Parties to this Agreement identified in clause 1;
- 2.2.4 "Project" means the project as described in Annexure "A";
- 2.2.5 "Signature Date" means the date of the last party signing this Agreement;
- 2.2.6 "the Act" means the Local Government: Municipal Finance Management Act of 2003, (Act No. 56 of 2003);

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- 2.2.7 "the CITY" means the City of Cape Town, a metropolitan municipality, established in terms of the Local Government: Municipal Structures Act, 117 of 1998 read with the Province of the Western Cape: Provincial Gazette 5588 dated 22 September 2000 as amended:
- 2.2.8 "the CITY's Financial year" means the financial year of the CITY commencing on 1 July in any given year and ending on 30 June of the following year;
- 2.2.9 "the WCEDP" means the Western Cape Economic Partnership a non-profit company with registration number 2012/015958/08 registered in terms of the laws of the Republic of South Africa;
- 2.2.10 "this Agreement" means this Agreement together with the Annexures hereto;
- 2.3 Any reference in this Agreement to legislation or subordinate legislation is to such legislation or subordinate legislation at the date of signature hereof and as amended or re-enacted from time to time.
- 2.4 Words importing the singular shall include the plural, and *vice versa*, words importing the masculine gender shall include the feminine and neuter genders, and *vice versa*, and words importing natural persons shall include legal persons, and *vice versa*.
- 2.5 If any provision in the definition clause is a substantive provision conferring rights or imposing obligations on a party, then notwithstanding that such provision is contained in this clause, effect shall be given thereto as if such provision was a substantive provision in the body of the agreement.
- 2.6 When any number of days is prescribed in this Agreement, same shall be a reference to business days and reckoned exclusively of the first and inclusively of the last day unless the last day falls on a day which is not a business day, in which case the last day shall be the next succeeding business day.
- 2.7 Where any term is defined within the context of any particular clause in this Agreement, the term so defined, unless it is clear from the clause in question that the term so defined has limited application to the relevant clause, shall bear the same

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meaning as ascribed to it for all purposes in terms of this Agreement, notwithstanding that the term has not been defined in this interpretation clause.

#### 3. PREAMBLE

- 3.1 The WCEDP is a Non-profit Company (NPC) that seeks to empower role-players with the opportunity to work together to improve the local and regional economy. Its focus is on enhancing competitiveness, increase sustainability growth and ensuring that growth is inclusive.
- 3.2 The WCEDP is designed to lead, coordinate and drive economic growth development and inclusion agenda for Cape Town and the Western Cape. The Parties have agreed to work together in the following areas:
  - (a) Quality access to decision makers;
  - (b) Support to strategic initiatives;
  - (c) Economic performance information an intelligence; and
  - (d) Delivering on the Western Cape Investment Framework.
- 3.3 The WCEDP submitted a business plan, to the CITY for funding to fulfil its objectives.

  The business plan is attached hereto as **Annexure "A**
- 3.4 The CITY is committed to collaborating with the WCEDP in achieving its objectives as set out in the business plan attached hereto as **Annexure "A"**.
- 3.5 The CITY Council resolved on 4 December 2013 under item number C50/12/13, a copy of the resolution which is attached hereto as Annexure "B" that;
  - (a) The CITY will support the activities of the WCEDP for a three(3) year period (2013/2014, 2014/2015 and 2015/2016);
  - (b) the CiTY will disburse **R2 100 000.00 (two million, one hundred thousand rand only)** (14% VAT where applicable) for the objectives and deliverables as mentioned in the Business Plan attached hereto as **Annexure "A"** for the CITY's 2013/2014 financial year; and
  - (c) the funding of the 2014/2015 and 2015/2016 financial year be subject to budget approval and after consideration of the relevant annual report by Council and approval of detailed deliverables for the 2014/2015 and 2015/2016 CITY's financial year.

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#### 4. PURPOSE AND GUIDING PRINCIPLES OF THE AGREEMENT

- 4.1 The purpose of the funding from the CITY is for the WCEDP to utilise the Funds in order to carry out the Project as set out in the agreed deliverables (**Annexure "A"**).
- 4.2 Before transferring funds of the CITY to an organisation or body outside any sphere of government (the WCEDP), the CITY is obliged in terms of Section 67(1)) (b) and (c) of the Act to satisfy itself that the organisation or body, ("the WCEDP") implements effective, efficient and transparent financial management and internal control systems to guard against fraud, theft and mismanagement and has in respect of previous similar transfers complied with all the requirements of this section.
- 4.3 The Parties hereby commit to fulfilling the applicable objects of the Act with regard to the payment stipulated in clause 6 of this Agreement.
- 4.4 In terms of section 67(3) of the Act, the accounting officer must, through contractual and other appropriate mechanisms, enforce compliance with the legislative requirements. The CITY and the WCEDP have thus agreed to the following terms and conditions, as recorded herein in compliance with section 67(3) of the Act.

#### 5 WHOLE AGREEMENT

- 5.1 This Agreement embodies the entire Agreement between the Parties.
- 5.2 No amendment, consensual cancellation or variation of any provisions of this Agreement or any settlement of a dispute relating to this Agreement, shall be of any force or effect unless reduced to writing and signed by both Parties.

#### 6. FUNDING ALLOCATION

6.1 For the 2013/2014 City's Financial Year:

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6.1.1 The CITY shall allocate to the WCEDP an amount of R2 100 000.00 (Two Million One Hundred Thousand Rand only), (VAT at 14% where applicable),

- 6.1.2 The allocation is hereby acknowledged by the WCEDP as a once off disbursement of R2 100 000.00 (Two Million, One Hundred Thousand Rand), (VAT at 14% where applicable) for the CITY's applicable financial year. (2013/2014)
- 6.1.3 The Funds shall be utilised for the purposes stipulated in the attached agreed deliverables, (Annexure "A").

#### 6.2 For 2014/2015 and 2015/2016 City's Financial Year:

- 6.2.1 The Funding Allocations for the 2014/2015 and 2015/2016 Financial Years are subject to Full Council's confirmation of budget availability, and approval of detailed deliverables based on progress reports and relevant annual reports which will be tabled at Full Council.
- 6.2.1 In the event of Full Council not approving any of the conditions mentioned in 6.2.1 above, then clause 6.2 will never become of any force and effect and neither Party will have any claim against the other in terms hereof or arising from the failure of this clause, save for any claims arising from a breach.

#### 7. DURATION

- 7.1 This Agreement commences on 1 July 2013 ("Commencement Date") and continues for three(3) years until 30 June 2016.
- 7.2 The Parties agree that the deliverables for the 2013/2014 financial year is to be completed by 30 June 2014.
- 7.3 The Parties agree that the continuation of this Agreement for the years 2014/2015 and 2015/2016 is subject to a review on 1 July 2014 and Full Council approving the conditions as recorded in clause 6.2.

#### 8. CAPACITY

8.1 The WCEDP warrants to the CITY that:-

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- 8.1.1 It has full capacity, power and authority to enter into this Agreement and to perform all of the obligations recorded in this Agreement;
- 8.1.2 the execution and performance by it of this Agreement will not cause a breach of any other Agreement to which it is a party; and
- 8.1.3 it will enter into such other Agreements with such other parties as may be necessary to fulfil its obligations to the CITY in terms of this Agreement, which other agreements shall in no way be in conflict or cause a conflict with the provisions of this Agreement.
- 8.2 This Agreement shall bind the WCEDP as presently constituted and all its successors in title and assigns, if any.

#### 9. OBLIGATIONS OF THE WCEDP

The WCEDP confirms that:

- 9.1 In respect of financial reporting:
- 9.1.1 It is able, willing and has the capacity to meet its obligations as recorded in this Agreement and to achieve it targets and outputs as recorded in **Annexure "A"**.
- 9.1.2 It will implement effective, efficient and transparent financial management and internal control systems, to guard against fraud, theft and financial mismanagement and to ensure that funding is utilised in accordance with Clause 6.1.3 above.
- 9.1.3 It will submit on or before the 7<sup>th</sup> of every month, monthly reports reflecting expenditure to the **Director: Economic Development** of the CITY.
- 9.1.4 In respect of previous similar transactions with government, has complied with all the requirements of the Act.
- 9.1.5 It will deposit the transferred funds into an interest bearing account until it can be utilised.

9.1.7	The Funds will be utilised in accordance with stated targets and outputs and contemplated in <b>Annexure</b> "A".
9.1.8	Expenditure vouchers, including cashed cheques, indicating the project number shall be retained for audit purposes.
9.1.9	It shall furnish the CITY with recent financial statements, prepared by a registered Accountant thirty (30) days after the Signature Date hereof.
9.1.10	Shall be responsible for the appointment of a registered Accountant to prepare their financial statements in respect of the financial year during which this Agreement is in force.
9.1.11	Audited financial statements indicating total allocation, total expenditure and total interest generated shall be submitted to the CITY within <b>two months (60 Days)</b> of completion of the project, or at the end of WCEDP's financial year, whichever comes first.
9.1.12	The audited financial statements must be submitted by the WCEDP and must consist of the following:
9.1.12.1	An Audit report (where applicable);
9.1.12.2	Financial statements consisting of/including the following;
9.1.12.2.	1 Income Statement;
9.1.12.2.	2 Balance Sheet;
9.1,12.2.	Notes to the financial statement; and
9.1.12.2.	Any other documentation required by legislation.
9.1.13	Surplus funds, including where interest is accrued from the transfer payment, shall be paid back to the CITY after the completion of the project.
9.1.14	It will declare and include in its progress and financial reports/statements, any other funds and/or goods obtained/secured from other sources that will be used for the rendering of the same service or administrative purposes as stated in this Agreement.

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- 9.1.15 It will keep a separate ledger account which must record all funds allocated to it by the CITY and reflect all transactions incidental to this Agreement, and must upon request by the CITY provide the CITY with all details of the account.
- 9.1.16 The CITY, its representative and/or the Auditor-General upon the written request of the CITY, be entitled to inspect all financial records of the Program as outlined in this Agreement including separate ledger account referred to in 9.1.15 above and may take copies or extracts thereof.
- 9.1.17 It shall cooperate fully with any financial audit procedure of the CITY, its representative or the Auditor-General and shall furnish any document, record, book of account or bank statement on written request.
- 9.1.17 It will:

  9.1.17.1 Pay all authorised expenses in terms of the approved Project;

  9.1.17.2 ensure the proper records of expenditure are maintained to support all financial transactions made in the execution of this Agreement;

  9.1.17.3 ensure that no individual in its employ has exclusive access to funds transferred by the CITY; and

  9.1.17.4 ensure that where a petty cash system is operated, it is adequately controlled and transactions are properly recorded.
- 9.1.18 The CITY shall be entitled to cancel this Agreement, and/or claim back the transferred Funds together with interest, and/or suspend the payment of funds and/or enforce any and all remedies available to it in terms of this Agreement and/or the law, should WCEDP fail to comply with its obligations in terms of this clause 9.1.

#### 9.2 In respect of progress reporting on the Services rendered

9.2.1 The WCEDP must furnish the CITY with monthly progress reports in respect of the non-financial data ('the NFD") which must be submitted to the CITY on or before the 7<sup>th</sup> working day of every month. (The details and the nature and type of information required are hereto attached as **Annexure D**.

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- 9.2.2 A comprehensive report shall be submitted by the WCEDP, its authorised officials or their designated nominee to the CITY, on a quarterly basis, within 2 (two) weeks of the completion of the quarter, pertaining to the transfer payment referring to the following:
- 9.2.2.1 the extent to which the WCEDP achieved the objectives for which this transfer payment has been granted; and
- 9.2.2.2 the performance information regarding the economical, effective and utilisation of the transfer payment.
- 9.2.3 Where applicable WCEDP must keep written records of the services rendered on behalf of the CITY in the form of registers that contain the names and identity numbers of the beneficiaries, the nature of the services rendered, the date the services were rendered and the quantum of the services rendered.
- 9.2.4 The CITY shall be entitled to cancel this Agreement, and/or claim back the transferred Funds together with interest, and/or suspend the payment of funds and/or enforce any and all remedies available to it in terms of this Agreement and/or the law, should WCEDP fail to comply with its obligations in terms of this clause 9.2.

#### 9.3 Compliance:

- 9.3.1 The WCEDP must for the duration of this Agreement adhere to all legislation, bylaws, policies, regulations and all legislation applicable to this Agreement.
- 9.3.2 The CITY shall be entitled to cancel this Agreement, and/or claim back the transferred Funds together with interest, and/or suspend the payment of funds and/or enforce any and all remedies available to it in terms of this Agreement and/or the law, should WCEDP fail to comply with its obligations in terms of this clause 9.3.

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## 10. OBLIGATIONS AND RIGHTS OF THE CITY

10.1 The City undertakes to transfer to the WCEDP the Funds as reflected in clauses 6.1 hereof, subject to the satisfactory fulfilment of the terms and conditions (where applicable) as set out in this Agreement.

10.2. The transfer shall be effected by means of an electronic funds transfer (EFT) from the CITY's bank account to the bank account of the WCEDP using the following banking details:

The CITY shall monitor and evaluate the WCEDP's performance and the utilisation of the Funds in respect of the approved Project (under this Agreement) in accordance with clause 13 hereof.

- 10.3 The CITY retains the right to request additional Expenditure reports.
- 10.4 The CITY may, in its discretion, periodically scrutinise the books and records of the WCEDP in relation to the activities funded by this grant and the progress of the activities in order to establish whether the funds are administered in an accountable and responsible manner.
- 10.5 If it is found that the WCEDP is guilty of unlawful conduct or negligence, or has utilised part or all of the Funds otherwise than for the purposes as set-out in the attached agreed deliverables, (Annexure "A"), the WCEDP shall forfeit its right to benefit from the Funds. If such situation arises, the CITY shall request the WCEDP to return the Funds, including any interest accrued (where applicable), to the CITY, and the WCEDP shall comply with such request within twenty(20) days after being requested to do so, failing which non-compliance will amount to a breach of contract. The amount refunded is to be paid into the CITY's bank account the details which are:

#### 11. FINANCES AND ACCOUNTING RECORDS

- 11.1 Appropriate accounting records in compliance with generally accepted accounting practices shall be maintained by WCEDP to record the utilisation of this transfer payment.
- 11.2 At the CITY's written request, WCEDP shall allow the CITY or its representative or the Auditor-General to inspect and copy any document, record, book of account or bank statement relating to the utilisation of this Transfer Payment.
- 11.3 The WCEDP shall cooperate fully with any financial audit procedure of the CITY or its representative or the Auditor-General and shall furnish any document, record, book of account or bank statement on written request.

#### .12. INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

- 12.1 All Intellectual Property rights of whatsoever nature belonging to the CITY, including, without limitation, the CITY's logo, emblem or any other form of corporate identity, shall remain vested at all times in the CITY.
- 12.2 The WCEDP shall not, under any circumstances whatsoever reproduce copy or use the CITY's corporate identity or permit the use of CITY's Intellectual Property by any third party, except as otherwise provided for herein and with the CITY's prior written consent.
- 12.3 The WCEDP (including its representatives, agents and employees) will not at any time, or in any manner, lower the dignity, standing and reputation of the CITY or in any way contest the validity of, or prejudice, any of the CITY's Intellectual Property rights, including its corporate identity, emblem or logo.



12.4 Insofar as the WCEDP is considered in law to be the original owner of the copyright in any document, drawing, material or record developed or acquired by the WCEDP in the course of discharging its obligations under this Agreement, it hereby grants the CITY the right to copy such document, drawing, material or record, for internal and external reporting and any other reasonable purpose.

#### 13. MONITORING AND EVALUATION

- 13.1 The monthly reports and other prescribed reporting, as outlined in clause 9.1 and 9.2 of this Agreement, constitutes the basis for the monitoring and evaluation of the fulfilment of the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 13.2 The reporting mentioned in clause 13.1 must be submitted to the **Director: Economic Development** in the CITY

#### 14. CONFIDENTIALITY

- 14.1 Except as otherwise provided in this clause, the terms and conditions of this Agreement, all data, reports, records and other information of any kind whatsoever developed or acquired by any party in connection with this Agreement ("the confidential information") shall be treated by the Parties as confidential. Neither of the Parties shall reveal or otherwise disclose such confidential information to any third party without the prior written consent of the other party and shall take all reasonable steps and precautions to ensure that such information remains strictly confidential and that any third party does not obtain access thereto or knowledge thereof. The foregoing restrictions shall not apply to the disclosure of necessary confidential information to employees, agents or contractors of the Parties. Any third party that may become privy to such information shall first undertake in writing to protect the confidential nature thereof.
- 14.2 The confidentiality undertaking in clause 14.1 hereof shall not apply in respect of confidential information within the public domain or a party's knowledge at the commencement of this Agreement or the disclosure is required to satisfy the order of a court or to comply with the provisions of any law or regulation in force from time to time.
- 14.3 The WCEDP is required to acknowledge the CITY as the provider of funding but shall not at any time during the term of this Agreement, release any statement to the press, or make any other public statement of any nature which could reasonably be

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expected to be published in any media regarding the relationship between the parties or the subject matter of this Agreement, without the prior written consent of the CITY. The CITY will appoint a designated person to ensure all communications and press releases are approved by the CITY within a period of 48(forty eight) hours, or such reasonable period, after receiving them from the WCEDP.

#### 15. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

- 15.1 The CITY shall not be liable to the WCEDP for any indirect or consequential loss or damage, including without limitation, loss of profit, revenue, anticipated savings, business transactions or goodwill or other contracts whether arising from negligence or breach of contract.
- 15.2 Notwithstanding anything contained in this Agreement, the CITY's maximum liability shall be limited, whether for a single or multiple events, to the extent of the funding amount as detailed in clauses 3.5 and 6.1 hereof and transferred to the WCEDP in terms of clause 10.1 hereof.

#### 16. NATURE OF RELATIONSHIP

- 16.1 This Agreement does not create an employment relationship, partnership, joint venture or agency between the parties and neither party shall be liable for the debts of the other party, howsoever incurred.
- 16.2 The WCEDP has no authority or right to bind the CITY to any third party and it shall be personally liable for any act purporting to so bind the CITY.

#### 17. IMPLEMENTATION AND GOOD FAITH

- 17.1 The Parties undertake to do all such things, perform all such acts and take all steps to procure the doing of all such things and the performance of all such acts, as may be necessary or incidental to give or conducive to the giving of effect to the terms, conditions and import of this Agreement.
- 17.2 The Parties shall at all times during the continuance of this Agreement observe the principles of good faith towards one another in the performance of their obligations in terms of this Agreement.

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#### 18. FORCE MAJEURE

- 18.1 Should any Party (hereinafter referred to as the "Invoking Party") be prevented from fulfilling any of its obligations in terms of this Agreement as a result of any act of God, strike, war, riots, fire, flood, legislation, insurrection, sanctions, trade dispute or economic embargo or any similar cause beyond the reasonable control of such Invoking Party (any such event hereinafter called "force majeure") then:
- 18.1.1 the Invoking Party shall forthwith give written notice thereof to the other Party;
- specifying the cause and anticipated duration of the *force majeure*; and
- 18.1.3 promptly upon termination of the *force majeure*, give written notice stating that such *force majeure* has terminated.
- 18.2 Performance of any such obligations shall be suspended from the date on which notice is given in terms of sub-clause 18.1.1 until the date on which notice is given in terms of 18.1.3
- 18.3 The Invoking Party shall not be liable for any delay or failure in the performance of any obligation hereunder, or loss or damage due to or resulting from the *force majeure* during the period referred to in clause 18.2 provided that:
- the Invoking Party uses and continues to use its best efforts and takes all reasonable steps to perform such obligation and provides the necessary notices as set out in clause 18.1.1 and 18.1.3;
- 18.4. if the force majeure continues for more than 10 (ten) days, the other Party shall be entitled to cancel this Agreement on the expiry of such period with immediate effect on written notice, but shall not be entitled to claim damages against the Invoking Party as a result of the delay or failure in the performance of any obligations hereunder due to or resulting from the force majeure, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement.

#### 19. BREACH, CANCELLATION AND TERMINATION

19.1 Should any Party ("the defaulting Party") commit a breach of any provision of this Agreement, including but not limited to the postponement or cancellation of the Project, and fail to remedy such breach, or if the breach is not capable of remedy,

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failing to implement remedial action acceptable to the other Party ("the aggrieved Party"), within thirty (30) calendar days of receiving a written notice from the aggrieved party requiring the defaulting party to do so, the aggrieved Party shall be entitled, in addition to its other remedies in law or in terms of this Agreement, to cancel this Agreement forthwith and without prejudice to its rights to claim damages; provided that if the defaulting Party commits two or more breaches of any material provision of this Agreement in any six(6) month period of this Agreement, the aggrieved Party shall be entitled without prejudice to any of its other rights or remedies in law or under this Agreement to terminate this Agreement forthwith by notice in writing to the defaulting Party.

- 19.2 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, the CITY shall be entitled to cancel this Agreement immediately if the other Party:-
  - 19.2.1 fails to make and implement the necessary plans to ensure that all funds obtained through this grant are expended for the intended purposes as detailed in the attached agreed deliverables (**Annexure "A"**);
  - 19.2.2 take steps to place itself, or is placed in liquidation, whether voluntary or compulsory or under judicial management, in either case whether provisionally or finally:
  - 19.2.3 takes steps to deregister itself or it is deregistered for some other reason;
  - 19.2.4 commits an act which would be an act of insolvency as defined by the Insolvency Act, 24 of 1936 as amended from time to time;
  - 19.2.5 fails to satisfy a judgement in excess of the amount of unutilised sponsorship funds entered against itself within twenty one (21) days after it becomes aware of the judgement, except if it provides evidence on an ongoing basis to the reasonable satisfaction of the CITY that steps have been initiated within the twenty-one(21) days to appeal, review or rescind a judgement and to procure suspension of execution of the judgement and that such steps are being expeditiously pursued, the period of twenty one (21) days shall run from the date on which the judgement becomes final, or the date on which the attempt to procure the suspension of the execution fails.

- 19.3 Should this Agreement be cancelled the Funds transferred to the WCEDP shall be immediately repaid to the CITY with interest *a tempora morae*. Such repayment to be directly deposited into the CITY's bank account (refer to clause 10.4 for details).
- 19.4 Cancellation or termination of this Agreement will not relieve a Party of obligations imposed upon such Party by statute or regulation or by this Agreement prior to its termination.

#### 20. INDEMNITY

- 20.1 The WCEDP indemnifies the CITY against any third party claims which may arise as a result of WCEDP's non-compliance with any provision of this Agreement or any negligent act or omission by it or its employees or representatives.
- 20.2 The WCEDP and/or its officers, employees, agents, concessionaries, suppliers, contractors or customers shall not have any claim of any nature against the CITY for loss damage, injury or death which any of them may directly or indirectly suffer arising from this agreement.

#### 21. CESSION AND ASSIGNMENT

- 21.1 No Party shall cede or assign its rights or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other Party, which consent may not be unreasonably withheld.
- 21.2 Any cession or assignment agreed to by a Party will not relieve the other Party of any obligations with respect to any covenant, condition, or obligation required to be performed by that Party under this Agreement.

#### 22. WAIVER

22.1 The failure of either Party to insist upon the strict performance of any provision of this Agreement or to exercise any right, power or remedy consequent upon a breach hereof shall not constitute a waiver by such Party to require strict and punctual compliance with each and every provision of this Agreement or estop such Party to exercise its rights in terms of this Agreement.



#### 23. APPLICABLE LAW

23.1 Regardless of the place of execution, performance or domicile of the Parties, this Agreement and all modifications and amendments hereof shall be governed by and construed under and in accordance with the laws of South Africa.

#### 24. JURISDICTION

24.1 The parties consent to the jurisdiction of the Western Cape High Court, Cape Town, in respect of all matters arising out of and disputes in connection with or in relation to this Agreement.

#### 25. DISPUTE RESOLUTION

- 25.1 Any dispute which arises between the Parties shall be referred to a joint committee of a member of the executive of the WCEDP and City Manager (Accounting Officer) or a Senior Manager of the CITY, or alternates appointed by them, who will use their best endeavours to resolve the dispute within fourteen (14) calendar days of the dispute having been referred to them.
- 25.2 Should the joint committee be unable to resolve a dispute in accordance with the above clause 25.1, such dispute will be submitted to and decided by arbitration in terms of clause 25.3.
- 25.3 Any dispute arising from or in connection with this Agreement shall be finally resolved in accordance with the rules of the Arbitration Foundation of Southern Africa ("AFSA") or its successor in title by an arbitrator who is agreed to between the Parties, or failing agreement within seven (7) calendar days of the dispute arising, an arbitrator or arbitrators appointed by the President of AFSA or his/her successor in title.
- Nothing in this clause shall prevent any Party from obtaining interim relief in a court pending the outcome of the arbitration.

26.3 Either Party hereto shall be entitled from time to time by written notice to the other, to vary its *domicilium* to any other address within the Republic of South Africa.

- 26.4 Any notice in terms of this Agreement may be hand delivered to the physical addresses of the Parties, in which event proof of acknowledgement shall be endorsed upon a copy of the notice together with the name of the recipient and date of receipt, or may be sent by registered post, in which event proof of postage issued by the relevant postal authority will serve as proof, or may be transmitted by telefax, in which event the facsimile transmission report will serve as proof of transmission, or may be sent by e-mail, in which event a hardcopy of the electronic record of transmission will serve as proof of transmission.
- 26.5 Any notice shall be deemed to have been received, until the contrary is proved:-
  - 26.5.1 If hand delivered during business hours on a business day, on the day of delivery;
  - 26.5.2 If sent by telefax, on the date of sending of such telefax;
  - 26.5.3 If posted by registered post from an address within the Republic of South Africa, on the fourth day after the date of posting;
  - 26.5.4 if sent by e-mail, on the date of sending such e-mail.

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
