#### PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to inform Subcouncil 4 of the process followed to ensure that the Subcouncil implemented the COVID-19 Coronavirus Humanitarian Food Relief Programme for wards 25, 26, 27, 28 and 30 to deserving and needy communities within its area of jurisdiction.

#### 5. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The ongoing global COVID-19 pandemic continues to negatively impact vulnerable communities, households and individuals. The city as part of its wider response management initiatives to the pandemic, granted the Urban Management Directorate a total of R25 million in the 2020/2021 financial year to implement a humanitarian food relief programme. Council approved R10 Million in January 2021 (C 09/01/21) for phase one and R15 million April 2021 for phase two, which commenced in February 2021.

Vulnerable communities faced further adversity because of the COVID-19 pandemic. In order to give effect to the City's vision of a caring City a total amount of R25 million was made available in the 2020/21 financial year for the rendering of food relief services across Subcouncil areas.

During phase two an amount of R 646 55,70 equating to R129 310,34 per ward (Wards 25, 26, 27, 28 and 30) was paid to Peninsula School Feeding Association, for the purpose of providing food parcels to individual households and through organisations and soup kitchens, as part of the humanitarian food relief programme.
